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FINAL PLEA FOR CLUES RE: GRAVE OF CHILD KILLED IN CIVIL RIGHTS BOMBING

(Boston, MA) -- Forensic Genealogist Liesa Healy-Miller of *Unsolved Histories* has been interviewed by WBHM, the NPR station based in Birmingham, Alabama.

Healy-Miller spoke about her two-year search for the long-lost remains of Addie Mae Collins, one of the "Four Little Girls" killed in the bombing of the 16th Street Baptist Church in Birmingham, Alabama.

This Sunday, September 15th, marked the 50th anniversary of the bombing.

To date, Healy-Miller has been unable to find hard evidence leading to Collins' specific resting place in a now-abandoned cemetery.

"This is a last-ditch appeal," she said. "There were throngs of people at the cemetery on the day of her burial. Maybe someone took a picture that's now sitting in a shoebox. Someone must have something; someone must know."

Despite the passage of the 50th anniversary, Healy-Miller vows that she will continue the search.

"We, as a country, owe it to the Collins family and to ourselves to help find those remains," she said. "The four girls who died that day symbolize the pain and triumph of the civil rights movement. Addie Mae Collins deserves to be found."

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
